- A.) Samson Birth Narrative, (Judges 13:1-24)
- B.) Samson and the Timnite Woman, (Judges 13:25-15:20)
- C.) Samson and the Gazite Woman, (Judges 16:1-31)

"Samson Introduction"

Both Samson (and Israel) are:

- 1.) Miraculously born by the will of God.
- 2.) Called to a life a separation and devotion to God.
- 3.) Defined by rash, selfish behavior.
- 4.) Drawn to foreign women/drawn to foreign gods

"Samson Introduction"

Cont'd.—Both Samson (and Israel) are:

- 5.) Brought into oppression and bondage of the enemy.
- 6.) Cry out to God from their oppression.
- 7.) Blinded as a result of their foolish behavior.
- 8.) Abandoned by God, and not aware of it (2:10; 16:20).

- <u>Deut. 12:8</u> Ye shall not do after all the things that we do here this day, every man whatsoever is right in his own eyes.
- Judg. 14:3 And Samson said unto his father, Get her for me; for she pleaseth me well.
- Judg. 17:6 In those days there was no king in Israel, but every man did that which was <u>right in his own eyes</u>.
- Judg. 21:25 In those days there was no king in Israel: every man did that which was right in his own eyes.

"Samson In Timnah"

Three Major Themes:

- 1.) Samson opposing God's Will: (Judges 14:1-3, 6-8)
- 2.) God's Sovereign Will in Samson's life: (Judges 14:4-6, 19)
- 3.) The complications of not cooperating with God's Will: (Judges 14:10-18, 20)
